

The homecoming football game and dance aren't happening until this weekend at Limestone High School.

But Wednesday night might have been the highlight of the whole week.

The homecoming court was announced, and so was the king.....

Limestone High School was rocking Wednesday night.

But the crowd went off the charts when the homecoming king was announced

"He's Levi Miller, he's the coolest guy, he walks around he knows everybody he's not afraid to talk to anybody."

That's what makes him so popular with the entire student body.

"I couldn't be any happier, he deserves it. He's really close to my heart and I wouldn't want anyone else to have it," explain Bailee Dunne, Levi's homecoming date.

Levi has Down syndrome, but that doesn't mean anything to his friends.

"At Limestone we look at him as one of us," explains Levi's friend, Calvin Peacock.

"I was excited," explains Levi of his nomination.

"I'm pretty excited, a lot of emotion, we're just so proud of him," says Levi's mom, Jodi Miller.

"We love him, you know, he's got a great personality and makes people smile. If you can do that then you're a great person," adds Peacock

"The kids at Limestone are just incredible; they've embraced Levi from day one," says his mom.

Levi's crowning is the cherry on top of an already stellar senior year...

"He actually just got his drivers permit the same week he was nominated for homecoming court. So, it was a pretty special week for us," adds his mom.

"We've never said there was nothing that he couldn't do," says Levi's dad, William. "And he's proved it this week."

When we asked Levi what he thought about making it this far--

"Because "I'm lucky, because my dad and mom, they're the nicest people ever."

It's clear they passed along those qualities to their son... Who, right now, is just ready for the dance...

Morton High School selects student with Down syndrome to homecoming court

MORTON — Jacob Urban is used to being in the spotlight.

He's performed in Penguin Project productions at the Eastlight Theatre in East Peoria for several years and he sings in the Morton High School choir.

So being in the high school's homecoming court this week will come naturally to him.

He was selected a senior class attendant and is in the running for homecoming king. The result of the vote will be announced Thursday night at the homecoming pep rally at Carper Field.

Jacob, 18, has Down syndrome.

"He is so proud of being in the homecoming court," said Rex Urban, Jacob's father. "He told everyone about it at the Penguin Project rehearsal the other night."

Rex and Annette Urban are proud parents. And a bit shocked, too, Rex Urban admitted.

"We knew the kids at school liked Jacob. We didn't realize how much," he said. "Their support for him says a lot about the students at the high school."

Jack Zern, a high school senior, has known Jacob since they were first-graders at Lincoln Elementary School.

"He's an awesome kid. Very funny," Zern said. "I voted for him for homecoming king. He got my vote. A lot of people I know voted for him, too."

High school special education teacher Megan Levitt has worked with Jacob for four years.

"He's laid back and funny, always laughing about something," she said. "When I walk through the halls, there's usually a group of kids around him."

District 709 Superintendent Lindsey Hall said she's excited about Jacob being in the homecoming court.

"It's an incredible sign of the inclusionary environment at the high school," she said.

The homecoming football game is Friday night against Pekin. The homecoming dance is Saturday night at the high school.

"Jacob is going to the dance with a friend from Mackinaw he knows through the Penguin Project," Rex Urban said.

Penguin Project productions involve youth with developmental disabilities playing roles in modified Broadway musicals alongside "peer mentors" of the same age. Rehearsals have begun for "Singin' in the Rain Jr.," which will be performed in January.
