

Meg was born I spoke on the phone with 2 moms who were further along their journey raising children with Down Syndrome. As I tried to process Meg's diagnosis and all that it meant, both women offered me friendship, support, honesty and perspective in their own ways. The first brought her son (who was about 3 at the time) to the hospital to see us the day after Meg was born. As her little one sat on my husband's lap (and stole his heart), this mom from HOIDSA began to share her experiences, fears, hopes in such a way that I felt she was making sense of all the things I was thinking but could not express. In those moments she helped me to see that although this journey was new and unexpected, I did not have to travel it alone. There would be others to help guide me along the way. The second mom I spoke to had a daughter who was about 7 or 8 at the time. She talked about the impact her daughter had on the other kids in the family and how her daughter was more like her siblings than different. As we spoke the mom looked out her kitchen window, laughed and said "in fact, she's out in the vard giving someone the business right now!" In that moment this mom offered me hope and a sense that while this journey was unexpected, there was going to be laughter and joy. Both of these women will always have a very special place in my heart, because they were the first from HOIDSA to open their hearts and share their experiences.

I love the spaghetti dinner because I know that even though I don't see either as much as I would like, I will see them that first Sunday of March every year. I look forward to those few minutes when I get with each to catch up, see their families, and hear how their kids are doing. I am incredibly thankful for HOIDSA because of these women and so many other amazing people who this group has helped me connect with. As Meg has grown, I have continually found mentors, answers, ideas and support at each step of the way.

I appreciate the education, support, resources and friendship this group provides. I hope that each of you has the opportunity to join us for dinner on March 4th and if you don't please check out another HOIDSA event soon. I promise you'll enjoy the experience.



Shut Up About Your Perfect Kid: A Survival Guide for Ordinary Parents of Special Children

STIPEND AND SCHOLARSHIP ASSISTANCE

FOR FAMILIES TO ATTEND EDUCATIONAL CONFERENCES



What is a STARNET Fellowship?

To promote family education and professional development for individuals in Northwest and Central Illinois, STARNET Region I & III (part of a grant funded through the Illinois State Board of Education) offers fellowships. A fellowship is a monetary award that reimburses eligible family members (up to \$125 each) and early childhood professionals (up to \$100 each) for certain expenses associated with attendance at an Illinois training event. Individuals may apply for a maximum of two fellowships per grant year (from July 1st to the following June 30th). Awards are based on available funds and approved at the discretion of the STARNET staff.

Family Fellowships

STARNET provides fellowship reimbursement funds for family members to attend educational and informative events in the State of Illinois. If you live within StarNET Region I & III, are a family member of a child two through six years of age with an IFSP or an IEP, you are eligible. Funds may be used for workshop registration, travel expenses/mileage, lodging, or childcare costs. Fellowship awards are not, in anyway based on your income. Limited funds are available for individual requests of up to \$125 per award. Individuals may apply for no more than two fellowships in the grant year from July 1st to the following June 30th. Fellowships are limited to two per individual, not two per family.

Application forms must be submitted at least one month prior to the event for which you are seeking funding.

Awards are based on available STARNET funds and are approved at the discretion of the STARNET Staff. The STARNET grant is funded through the Illinois State Board of Education. If there are any questions about the process, please call (800) 227-7537 ext 251.

How do I Apply?

At least ONE MONTH before the event, mail or fax a fellowship application or fill out the online form: https://starnet.org/home/fellowships-2/fellowships-form/

PRE-APPROVAL IS REQUIRED.

The Arc of Illinois, through a grant from the Illinois Council on Developmental Disabilities, administers the Consumer Involvement Program and distributes consumer stipend funds to enable people with developmental disabilities and their family members to attend conferences of their choice that are directly related to developmental disability issues.

What Can I Apply For?

Conference must be <u>directly related</u> to developmental disabilities at an in-state or out-of state conference

How much can I apply for?

- \$400 per person per year
- \$700 per family per year

Limitations: Participants are limited to a maximum of two stipends per year per individual or family within funding limit.

What Can I Use These Funds For?

- Conference Registration
- Child Care
- Respite Care
- Meals
- Personal Attendant
- Hotel
- Transportation

How Do I Apply?

The application form must be completed and returned to The Arc of Illinois with a copy of the conference brochure and a completed registration form at least 30 days prior to the date of the conference/workshop.

Adorable Lucas Warren made history last week by becoming the first "Gerber Baby" with Down Syndrome in the

company's 91-year history. The 18-month-old from Georgia was chosen from a pool of 140,000 babies who entered the contest, and his parents, Jason and Cortney Warren, say they were shocked by the news.

"It's almost like a dream," Cortney Warren, from Dalton, Georgia, tells PEOPLE. "I think it takes a minute to really set in, like, this *i*s real."

Since then, the couple has received thousands of messages on social media—they say they're still getting used to all of the attention.

"It's very humbling," Jason Warren says. "Who knew our child was going to touch so many people and make that many people smile. We're loving what everybody is saying about our little boy. Lucas is loving it—he's loving all these new people he gets to wave at."

Cortney says she entered Lucas into the contest on a whim at her son's godmother's urging. While Lucas is definitely soaking up his time in the spotlight, his parents say Lucas is not much different than any other toddler.

"He's pretty much like every child around this age, loves learning, loves to laugh, loves to make other people laugh, always waving and smiling at everyone," she says. "He loves it when complete strangers wave and smile back at him. It makes his day." The winning photo of Lucas, which features him in a polka dot bowtie and green button-up shirt, was snapped after his first Sunday at church.

PUNS Process/Housing Options

At the Housing & Funding Options workshop on January 25th, Lisa Evans from CISA provided a detailed handout about the Prioritization of Urgency of Need for Services (PUNS) waitlist, including the enrollment process, how the PUNS selection works, and services that are available after an individual is selected. A handout was also distributed that includes a summary of service definitions, types of housing options for the developmentally disabled, and vocational programs for adults. Greg Cassidy from TCRC seemed very willing to "think outside the box" for creative housing and employment options for which his agency could provide assistance.

Hundreds of Parents of Kids with Down Syndrome Are Getting "The Lucky Few Tattoo"

Months later, what's resulted is a simple and clean three-arrow tattoo on the bodies of hundreds of par-

ents, referred to as "the lucky few tattoo."




"The three arrows symbolize the three 21st chromosomes and how we rise up and move forward. We fly the highest after we have been pulled back and stretched, sometimes even more we think we can bear." There's no overestimating how much a sense of belonging can help people through hard times. The Lucky Few Tattoo is a constant, visual reminder for these parents of why the challenges are worth it.
